Exploring Our Faith Together

Year of St. Paul marked in Foundations journey

St. Paul's spiritual journey will be explored in a 10part Foundations session being offered in the diocese of Saskatoon to mark the Year of St. Paul launched in June by Pope Benedict XVI.

Calling upon scripture, artwork and her own recent pilgrimage to Greece and Turkey "in the footsteps of St. Paul", Sr. Teresita Kambeitz, OSU, paints a dynamic picture of Paul, the "Apostle to the Gentiles" and patron saint of the diocese.

In reflecting on the life of Paul, she also encourages her listeners to relate Paul's spiritual journey to their own faith experience.

People of all ages are welcome to attend individual sessions, or to take in the entire series, said Foundations coordinator Marci Deutscher. "Offering faith enrichment that spans more than one evening is something that we've wanted to do for a long time," she said of the 10-part program.

The Tuesday sessions take place once a month until June, held from 7:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. at St. Paul's Cathedral hall (see schedule, lower right). Registration is not required - there will be an opportunity to make a free will offering at each session.

At the series launch Sept. 9, about 75 people gathered to hear Sr. Teresita describe Paul's background as a faithful and committed Jewish believer growing up in a Greek community. Smart, articulate and extremely religious, the young man called Saul was passionately devoted to his religion and very faithful, she described, noting his involvement in the persecution of the

Monday, June 29 - Celebration of Eucharist with Bishop Albert LeGatt. early Christian community in Jerusalem. Then came the conversion experience on the road to Damascus that challenged his understanding of God.

"Paul experienced something of the heart. He encountered a personal Lord who loved him. This was brand new," Sr. Teresita said, likening it to life-changing events that create a "before and after" division in our own lives. "This shattered Paul's whole world," she said.

As a follow up to the session, Sr. Teresita encouraged participants to consider reflection questions in the weeks ahead, and perhaps share their insights with one or two others. (The summary and questions can be found on the diocesan website: www.saskatoonrcdiocese.com)



Message from the Bishop

Dear Friends.

As I write this letter to you, it is a glorious fall day. We have indeed been blessed with verv beautiful fall weather this year, and that's been good for farmers and gardeners alike. This season of the year is an invitation to reflect upon God's many blessings to us: the blessings of creation, but also the blessings of family and good friends; the blessings of our faith and our faith community; the



blessing of God's incredible love for us, shown in so many ways.

In our diocese, this fall season is also the time for the **Bishop's Annual Appeal**, a way to give back in gratitude and stewardship a portion of the blessings we have received. Your Bishop's Annual Appeal gift is an offering both to God and to our Church. Your gift helps fund the many programs that assist us in growing together as a faith community in our diocese, as well as supporting many other services that build up a more just and caring society. I invite you to be generous as you consider God's goodness to us at this time of the year.

This fall in our diocese we are also very heavily engaged with spreading the news about our new Cathedral and Pastoral Centre campaign – our **Uniting in Faith** campaign. Along with the many efforts of our campaign team under the leadership of Don Gorsalitz, I am personally visiting all the parishes in the city of Saskatoon and reaching out to all the parishes of our rural area through ten town hall meetings (see the schedule on Page 5).

Once again the goal is to reflect together upon how God has blessed our diocese in the past with strong and visionary bishops, priests, religious and lay people, committed to building up a Church capable of reaching out with God's love to all. Reflecting upon the strength of our diocese at present, but also considering the many needs yet to be fulfilled – in terms of adult faith formation and lay leadership, youth ministry and evangelization, sharing the faith with our children, vocations, efforts for justice and so many more areas within our Church's life – this project of a new Cathedral and especially a muchneeded larger Pastoral Centre is really about strengthening the future of our diocese.

I invite you to become much more informed about this whole project as campaign teams are organized in each parish this fall. We will launch the campaign across the diocese in January and hope to be successful enough to begin construction in the autumn of 2009 or in the spring of 2010. These are challenging yet exciting times for our diocese!

This fall will also see our **Study Days** for pastors, Parish Life Directors and lay pastoral associates focus on adult faith formation and growing in our faith. A diocesan **Congress** of priests, Parish Life Directors, and the Diocesan Pastoral Council will focus on setting the vision and priorities for our diocese in the coming five years.

Another matter of note is the launch this year of our **Steps in Faith** program to ensure that our children, having been fully initiated through baptism, confirmation and Eucharist, will continue to grow in learning about and living out their faith. This new program will begin to be phased in across the diocese for youth in Grades 6, 7 or 8, and will involve catechesis, prayer, service and a reaffirmation of faith ceremony.

So much is happening in our diocese and so much more needs to happen in the future to assure we are faithful to the mission Jesus Christ has given us of being messengers and instruments of the blessing of God's love to all. Let us indeed always be united in our faith, in our gratitude and in our commitment.

Telling the story of the BAA

It's important to continue telling the story of the Bishop's Annual Appeal (BAA) and all that it means within the diocesan faith community, BAA director Rev. Ken Beck told parish leaders from across the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saskatoon at a Sept. 9 Administration Day held at St. Mary's parish.

"The more that people know about the Appeal, the more likely they are to support it," Beck said, noting that the BAA again exceeded its goal in 2007.

The 2008 goal of \$1,040,000 will go to 28 different initiatives, organizations and ministries within the diocese of Saskatoon, ranging from ecumenism to support of life, from education of future priests to youth ministry. This year's Appeal is now

underway, with parish teams and volunteer visitors in the process of contacting parishioners across the diocese .

Even in this 25th year of the BAA, it is still necessary to clearly communicate what the Appeal supports, Beck said. "Some of the people we are talking to weren't even born when the Appeal began," he said, stressing the critical role of parish leaders and volunteers in explaining what the BAA is all about, and what ministries and projects are possible because of the ongoing support provided by the BAA.

Citing the example of **Rural Catechetics** – a diocesan ministry office funded almost entirely by the Bishop's Annual Appeal – Beck urged parish leaders to explain how Rural Catechetics helps rural parishes meet the challenge of catechizing children, specifically in areas without access to resources such as a publicly-funded Catholic education system. "I'm confident that if we explain the problems facing people in the rural parts of our diocese, the urban people are more than willing to help."

coordinator Tony Haynes, Beck noted that this is another ministry supported by the BAA. "It makes a person feel good and feel proud that we as a diocese are involved in these areas," Beck said

Lay Formation, which has played a role in the faith development of hundreds of Catholic parishioners over the years, is also supported by the BAA. "What a significant difference this has made to the faith life and faith growth of people in the diocese," Beck observed, urging parish leaders to tell about such benefits when they tell the story of the BAA. "We've got a good story. We've got a successful story."

Organizations such as L'Arche Saskatoon, Teen Aid, Friendship Inn, Catholic colleges, and Catholic Family Services also receive financial support from the BAA, Beck pointed out.

"Twenty five years ago when we gathered to launch the Bishop's Annual Appeal, Bishop James Mahoney gathered with about 20 or 25 priests in the basement of the pastoral centre. I don't recall that there were any lay people present or involved," Beck said. "The Bishop's Annual Appeal has impacted significantly on who we are and what we're all about and it has made a difference in our ability to extend our ministries."

BAA administrator Charlene Nijhawan likened the busy start up of the Annual Appeal to the back to school season with its rush to get supplies, buy shoes, and pay fees.

"It can all seem pretty expensive and time consuming and yet as a parent, one is grateful that one's child has the opportunity to live such a full life. Similarly, we should all be grateful that this is a diocese that has a full life," she told the gathering of parish representatives. "We have a gold mine of resources, not the least of which is all of you."

Bishop Albert LeGatt described the encouragement he receives when he travels the diocese and hears about life in the parishes; news of initiatives and undertakings in areas such as catechetics or youth ministry; and connections built up between parishes and the diocese.

"It is mutually enriching," he said. "For me, that's what the BAA is — it is a family of faith, working together... ultimately it's about a life of faith being shared and strengthened together."

LeGatt also stressed the importance of prayer to the BAA effort. "This is about stewardship, it is about all that we have been gifted with, especially our faith, our Church, one another – as well as our material gifts."

Major donors step forward in campaign to build new Cathedral and Catholic Pastoral Centre

A Uniting in Faith campaign for a new Catholic Pastoral Centre and Cathedral in the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saskatoon has so far raised about \$9 million, including several major donations announced this spring.

The *Uniting in Faith* Campaign is now beginning the next phase – approaching the faithful in parishes across the diocese (see article next page).

Early in May, Bishop Albert LeGatt joined campaign co-chair Barry Frank at a media conference held to announce several large contributions to the project.

Donations of \$1.5 million from Joe and Marie Remai, \$1 million from Les and Irene Dubé, \$1 million from John and Sonya Remai, as well as one anonymous donation for \$1 million and two more for \$500,000 were announced. Later in May, another \$61,805 was raised at an annual Bishop's Dinner.


The large donations helped provide an excellent start to the *Uniting in Faith* campaign to build a new Cathedral and Catholic Pastoral Centre in conjunction with construction of a new Holy Family parish home in northeast Saskatoon, said Barry Frank, who co-chairs the diocesan campaign with his wife Giselle.

Holy Family parish has committed itself to raising \$16 million for construction of the building, while the diocesan-wide *Uniting in Faith* campaign has a \$12.5 million target.

"This project is about the future of our diocese and all that our diocese tries to be for the sake of the mission of living out the gospel in our world," said Bishop LeGatt.

"It will create a place to celebrate the unity of our diocesan family and serve as a destination and resource for the faithful. In short, this project will help assure and serve the future of the diocese in everything it means to be together as a diocese."

An understanding about the real need for the new Cathedral and Catholic Pastoral Centre lies behind these major gifts, Frank said, noting reasons donors cite for supporting the campaign.

Joe Remai said that the impetus to donate \$1.5 million came with a realization that the Catholic diocese has simply outgrown the existing cathedral and Catholic Centre. "Construction costs have skyrocketed, and they're still going up, and we need a good number of people donating bigger sums. Fortunately, we are able to help," he said after the press conference.

"The church is very close to us and we are a spiritual family," said Les Dubé. "We have the ability to fund projects and our faith teaches us to be stewards."

John Remai said "this is a wonderful opportunity to further the heritage of faith that my parents brought with them when they immigrated to Canada, and which they instilled in their family."

Don Gorsalitz of the diocesan development office said that in his 15 years of fund-raising work in the city he has never seen such an extraordinary response to a fund-raising campaign.

"I've seen young couples with young children make extraordinary pledges," Gorsalitz said of the *Uniting in Faith* campaign that is also happening at the grassroots level at Holy Family parish in northeast Saskatoon and which will soon expand to all parishes in the diocese in preparation for an anticipated construction start in the fall of 2009 or early 2010.

"It's not only the million-dollar

donations and the half-million-dollar donations that are going to turn our dreams into reality," Frank said, reflecting on the Holy Family parish portion of the campaign, where every grassroots donation is a vital contribution to that parish's \$16 million share of the project.

Irene Dubé also stressed the importance of involvement from many people at many different levels of giving. "It's not only the \$1 million gift. It's the fives and the tens that add up incredibly. If a person gives \$5 a day and you do that over a year, it has a big impact."

Les Dubé added that the satisfaction of contributing is not dependent on the size of a donation. "We want everyone to experience the kind of joy we get out of doing this."

News of the major donations provided a boost to volunteers at Holy Family parish working on the *Uniting in Faith* campaign, said parish priest Rev. David Tumback.

"This gives a renewed energy and a renewed enthusiasm to all the people that are involved and are active in the process of the home visits, the solicitation of gifts and also just the overall positive image of the project," Tumback said. "I'm delighted and I'm very, very grateful for the faith-filled people who have stepped forward."

Uniting in Faith campaign to begin in parishes across the diocese

A campaign to raise funds for a new Cathedral and Catholic Pastoral Centre will move into its next phase over the next few weeks - with parishioners across the diocese approached for their support.

"We will be asking people to consider an investment in their faith, and in the future growth and endeavours of our Church in this diocese," said Don Gorsalitz of the diocesan development office.



Calling on local volunteers, and commun-

icating the need through materials such as videos and fact sheets, the Uniting in Faith campaign is about more than one construction project, Gorsalitz stressed. It also has the potential to secure greater long-term financial commitment for all of our parish faith communities as the faithful are asked to examine their capacity to give, he said.

"I'm confident that as people examine what their faith has meant to them, and begin to envision what they would hope for the future, they will respond generously as so many already have," Gorsalitz said.

As the campaign moves into the parish phase, Bishop Albert LeGatt and the Uniting in Faith team will be holding town hall meetings and visiting parish communities across the diocese to provide more information and answer questions (see schedule at right).

Bishop explains project rationale

At recent meetings, town hall sessions, and deanery gatherings across the diocese, Bishop Albert LeGatt has been answering questions and providing an overview of the *Uniting in Faith* campaign and its history.

The opportunity to build a new Cathedral and Diocesan Pastoral Centre grew out of the immediate need for a new church home for Holy Family parish in the northeast part of Saskatoon.

"The worship space that Holy Family parish will eventually need is about 1,300 seats. That's exactly what the diocese now needs in a cathedral, for our diocesan celebrations, such as the Chrism Mass or ordinations," LeGatt said at a media conference in May. "It's a very good match."

Located next to St. Joseph Catholic High School on Attridge Drive, the new cathedral parish will exist in the centre of many growing neighbourhoods, the bishop said.

As the home of the diocesan Catholic Pastoral Centre, the project "will also support existing and increased development and delivery of more diocesan programs and outreach ministries, expanding vital programs to people and parishes across the diocese," he added.

The diocesan Catholic Pastoral Centre will be home to over 40 programs and services, such as rural catechetics, youth ministry, adult faith formation, justice and peace, family life, scripture study, lay ministry development, vocation promotion and hospital ministry. It will also house the diocesan Resource Library and the chancery offices.

"These services and programs exist for one reason alone – to offer the parishes and people involved in ministry throughout the diocese the knowledge, resources, training and support needed to carry out the mission of the Church," LeGatt said, describing how he is constantly reminded of the great richness of faith, people, service and generosity within the diocese of Saskatoon.

"The new diocesan Catholic Pastoral Centre and Cathedral will be the core of our functioning spiritual faith community," LeGatt said.

"Guiding us to live together as faithful followers of Christ and vibrant members of a Church called to be a sign of the gospel of Jesus Christ and the kingdom of God in central Saskatchewan, it will be a sign of what we share in faith, and a vital investment in the future, giving us what we need to grow and truly serve all."

Parish Nurse Ministry provides vital outreach at St. Mary's

Parish nurse ministry is an invaluable and much needed outreach in the core neighbourhood served by St. Mary's Roman Catholic Parish.

The fifth annual auction in support of parish nurse ministry will be held Saturday, Oct. 18, starting at 10 a.m. in St. Mary's Parish Hall, located on the corner of Avenue O and 20th Street West in Saskatoon.

Benefits of the parish nurse program spread far beyond the parishioners of St. Mary's to include the vulnerable and marginalized in the area.

For generations, St. Mary's has been the spiritual home for countless families. Today, besides being a functioning parish with its own needs, St. Mary's is surrounded by many needs in the heart of the Pleasant Hill neighbourhood – from addictions issues and poverty, to mental and physical health concerns. Having a registered nurse on staff helps the parish respond to many of those concerns.

WHAT IS PARISH NURSE MINISTRY?

Rooted in the vision of Christ as healer, this ministry grows out of the belief that the faith community is a place of healing. Parish nurse ministry reflects a gospel understanding of healing, which emphasizes the wholeness of mind, body and spirit. The parish nurse is an RN who ministers to individuals and families as a knowledgeable health care provider, while bringing the love, care and prayer of the faith community to one who is suffering.

WHAT DOES A PARISH NURSE DO?

Sr. Carol Borreson, SGM, is a registered nurse employed by St. Mary's Parish. She addresses and assists with health issues for those with low incomes in Pleasant Hill, and supports and refers families from the neighbourhood to appropriate government, medical and social agencies. She deals with health

issues related to addictions, mental health, aging, and chronic illness. Sr. Carol responds to some emergency medical concerns and provides preventative intervention.

Parish nursing treats more than just the ailment; providing a holistic approach which cares the entire person – body, mind and spirit.

"The core of my ministry is being present to families or individuals seeking assistance, support, spiritual support, information or guidance in working through health issues," says Sr. Carol.

Those issues might include changes in health or a health crisis; understanding medication; terminal illness; death, dying, grief or bereavement. It might involve single parents or newcomers to Canada seeking support with maternity and childbirth, or issues of parenting.

As a parish nurse Sr. Carol also assists families in assessing the level of care needed by family members and then seeking appropriate housing options. She also serves as a resource to individuals and families requiring support or direction to access specialized care such as palliative care, mental health, rehabilitation, or addiction services.

ANNUAL AUCTION OCT. 18 SUPPORTS CAUSE

Organizers point out that by supporting the auction Oct. 18, the community at large is supporting a worthy cause in one of Saskatoon's core neighbourhoods.

"As Catholic Christians, we are called to care for the sick, the suffering and the marginalized, just as Christ himself did. The parish nurse program of St. Mary's takes its inspiration from Christ's mission, and cares for just such people in Pleasant Hill today," says St. Mary's associate pastor Fr. Tony Bidgood, CSsR.

"Spiritual and material support of our Parish Nurse Auction not only helps keep this vital ministry alive, but involves each of us in the very mission of Christ to which we are all called."

St. Augustine's in Humboldt reaches out through Oblate Parish Mission

Who is our neighbour?

This is the lead question preparing parishioners of St. Augustine's Parish in Humboldt for the Oblate Parish Mission experience in March 2009. With some 1,400 families on parish records, the preparations are extensive and require the commitment of several hundred parishioners even before the Oblate Mission Team arrives to do their part.

"We don't necessarily know who lives in our neighbourhoods anymore," says Cecile Buehler, pointing to the large numbers of new families having moved to Humboldt in the past decade.

Buehler is part of the committee organizing the parish list into zones, geographical groupings of about 35 to 40 families with a Catholic connection. Fifty-five zones have been identified within city limits, and another six

zones in the surrounding rural areas. Each zone will identify a home to host small Christian community gatherings, called Listening Centres, during the mission.

Other parishioners have been working on the publicity end of the mission preparations, including development of a logo, banners, posters and brochures. The logo, an image of the



church steeple, was extensively discussed, reflected and prayed about by both the publicity committee and the entire Mission Core Team of 25 people who have been working together for the past six months. "The steeple invites us to gather under one roof in order to grow more fully into the faith community which Jesus Christ calls us to," describes one parishioner.

Fr. Emile April, parish priest at St. Augustine's, first suggested to parish council that the Oblate Mission Team be invited to Humboldt.

"I have great hopes for this mission," he says. "From my years of ministering in Brazil I know the power of working with committed laity in local groups. I hope this mission will renew our faith community, will equip ordinary parishioners to grow in faith and confidence, and will become the basis for a new way of being parish."

A special effort will be made to reach out to inactive Catholics. "Whether you go to church

every Sunday or whether you haven't been to church for many years, we want to include you," says a letter from Fr. April which will be delivered by parishioners in a personal visit to every home with a Catholic connection. The mission experience will equip parishioners to become missionaries to their own people in their own backyard.

Visitors to these biblical lands, the cradle of the great faiths, often begin by looking forward to a wonderful and exciting vacation, but they invariably single out spiritual transformation and general enrichment as the most memorable and significant part of the journey, he added. "This is true even if they are not particularly religious people. They all come home a little changed in their spirit and thinking".

When asked whether it is safe to travel to the Middle East, Kleiter points out that millions of people visit these biblical lands every year and return safe, fulfilled and inspired. He noted that over half of the spaces on this "Year of Paul" offering are already taken.
