John Sianchuk, CSsR, representing Bishop Brian Bayda of the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of Saskatoon; Bishop Rodney Andrews of the Anglican Diocese of Saskatoon; Rev. Hugh Farmer, representing Bishop Cynthia Halmarson of the Saskatchewan Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Canada; Renata Klassen, Moderator of Mennonite Church Saskatchewan; Bishop Albert LeGatt of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saskatoon; Rev. Deborah Walker, Chair of the United Church of Canada River Bend Presbytery; and Spencer Hanson, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada Presbytery of Northern Saskatchewan. The celebration also marked the 50th anniversary of Pope John XXIII's call for the Second Vatican Council, which included a renewed focus on the call to Christian unity.

"Rooted in Christ" - A Diocesan Vision

Evangelization and ongoing faith formation are among the six priorities in a Diocesan Vision unveiled recently in the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saskatoon. A wide variety of events and programs publicized in this edition of Exploring Our Faith reflect efforts across the diocese to live out these priorities. This mini-newsletter contains information about Foundations enrichment sessions, youth events, the diocesan Lay Formation program, Ministry Development training, social justice activities, speakers, retreats, conferences, workshops and resources.

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MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP

Dear friends,

This newsletter comes as you are well into the second part of that parish schedule of activities and programs that seems to run from September to June.

I wish you all the best in your efforts to help all to grow in understanding of our faith, in participating ever more fully in the liturgical celebrations that express and nourish our faith, and in living out that faith in greater holiness and service. The goal of all our pastoral efforts is, of course, to be "Rooted in Christ" and to be one together in Him.

These two values of life – to live in Christ and to be united to others through Him – are at the heart of the *Rooted in Christ* Diocesan Vision articulated in the fall of 2008.

The vision came about as a result of a year's work by the Diocesan Pastoral Council, the Council of Priests, and the Diocesan Pastoral Centre staff. This vision was released at the Diocesan Congress in November and is being carried forth by the Diocesan Pastoral Council to the deanery and parish council levels.


The intent is that over the next five to six years, parish councils will focus on each of six priorities or major areas of pastoral life in our Church, considering how their particular parish community is called to grow. These six areas are:

- 1. Evangelization
- 2. Faith Formation
- 3. Liturgy and Worship
- 4. Community
- 5. Justice and Peace
- 6. Collaboration to strengthen unity.

Hopefully, one fruit of this effort will also be to identify areas of parish life that might be strengthened through greater cooperation with neighbouring parishes in a cluster or deanery. To reinvent everything all the time, or to try to go it alone, simply means that our efforts will be limited, when in fact our parishes would greatly benefit from cooperation and mutual support.

This sense of walking and working together to grow in our faith is certainly also at the centre of our *Uniting in Faith* campaign to build the new Holy Family Cathedral and Diocesan Pastoral Centre.

I have had the occasion over the autumn and early winter to go to many communities to speak of this project and



gather your comments. Developing a sense of being a diocese, truly working together, is a huge and ongoing effort, one that can never be taken for granted.

An essential aspect in this regard is to better communicate what the Diocesan Pastoral Centre can offer parishes for their vitality and growth.

Another aspect is fostering neighbouring parishes' communication with each other about ways they might support each other in areas such as youth ministry or in training volunteers to provide pastoral care to the sick and those who are shut in. The possibilities of joint efforts are limitless.

Therefore as I ask for your solid support for the Cathedral and Diocesan Pastoral Centre, I also ask for your prayers: that this project will be but one of many efforts to truly become one in our diocese. May we indeed be "Uniting in Faith."



Faith integral part of effort to build Cathedral and Pastoral Centre, says campaign team member

Jocelyne Hamoline's faith plays a large role in her work on the diocesan *Uniting in Faith* campaign team.

Living out our baptism; following God's will; sharing blessings received; glorifying the Lord – those are spiritual realities behind the diocesan campaign to build a new Cathedral and Catholic Pastoral Centre, Hamoline says. And they are also what keep her going when she meets with parishes to explain the project or to plan fundraising strategy.

"For me, number one, I understand that the hand of God is on this project," she says. "The bishop and others across the diocese have prayed and discerned about this ... I share their belief that through this project, bigger and better things can happen for us as a diocese. We can become more engaged, more alive in our faith and have a greater understanding of who we are as a faith community."

Hamoline sees the project as a way to give back what she's received and to bless others as she's been blessed, with faith formation and support.

"As persons of faith we're called not just to be concerned for ourselves, or even our individual families and parishes. We're called to look beyond our doors, to look to the whole diocese and beyond, to 'pay it forward' to future generations," Hamoline says.

"One hundred years ago, someone invested in my faith by building a church, by making sure I had a priest, by providing all of those components and events that we need in our lifelong journey of faith. So the question becomes: am I willing to do the same thing? Am I willing to invest in someone's



faith, to pay it forward, 10, 20, 50 years from now? We're making sure that tomorrow's generation has the opportunity to know the love and hope, forgiveness, healing, peace and joy from Our Lord Jesus Christ."

Our faith journey does not end with baptism, confirmation and first communion, she stresses. "Faith is a journey until we pass away and meet the Lord, and we do have a responsibility to accept that journey and to continue learning and to continue growing in holiness and growing in understanding."

Parishes can look to the Catholic Pastoral Centre for resources and support, but the goal is to develop the faith of people across the diocese, so they can become resources to others, she says.

"For instance, Lay Formation is about giving people from across the diocese the opportunity to learn more about who they are as Christian Catholics, and who they are in terms of their own faith journey. They can then turn around and share that walk with others, with their parish, with the world."

God can take every small action and every person's faith and make big things happen, she added, saying she firmly believes God will bless parishes and individuals through this campaign

"Faith is an action word."

Ten-part Foundations offering about St. Paul proves popular: next session Tuesday, March 10

Just past the half way point of a 10part Foundations program about St. Paul led by Sr. Teresita Kambeitz, OSU, interest remains strong.

Attendance has run from between 70 and 100 people each session, said diocesan Foundations co-ordinator Marci Deutscher. "Sr. Teresita is bringing Paul to life, and it's just so good that people keep coming back for more of his story," Deutscher said.

Offering a more intensive
Foundations program is a departure
from the usual talks booked by parishes
and faith groups, which generally run
only as a single two-hour session, she
noted (see listings on Page 6-7). For the
10-part Foundations sessions on St.
Paul there is no pre-registration
required, and each evening is kept to
one hour. A free will offering is taken at

the door, and refreshments are served at the end of the evening.

Sr. Teresita Kambeitz uses a combination of storytelling, artwork, symbols and faith reflection questions to explore the life of St. Paul and to help her listeners relate Paul's journeys to their own spiritual journeys.

Justice and Peace representatives discuss food issues

The Saskatoon diocesan Justice and Peace office recently called together parish representatives of this ministry as a first step in identifying needed programs and actions for the year. Uppermost were concerns for the poor and their way of life in the diocese of Saskatoon. Less emphasis was placed on national and world issues, such as peace in Afghanistan.

In mid-November an evening of education on food security was held at St. Patrick's Parish. Close to 30 people heard presentations by director Paul Merriman of the Saskatoon Food Bank and Verna Vandale of Guadalupe Parish.

Merriman gave details about the operation of the food bank in terms of clientele, service offered and its philosophy of providing good nutritious food. Between 300 and 400 visit every day with each person allowed two visits per month. Before this can happen, the person must register by providing a provincial health card for each member of the family.

The food provided by the food bank is nutritious, he said. "Donated junk food is passed on to the schools for their special events." A major item that must be purchased is milk, costing \$120,000 a year. Eighty-five per cent of the food distributed comes from major stores in the city.

"No one is turned away" Merriman said. Tamara House, Friendship Inn and other agencies are also served by the food bank.

It has become a one-stop service centre with a free tax service, a counseling service connected to Catholic Family Services, and in a separate building a block away, a clothing store operates. The clothing store's unique features are that for \$2 a person can fill a bag twice a week, and if the chosen items need washing, a machine with detergent is available.

Merriman ended by identifying many parishes that regularly supply food items.

Verna Vandale described the emergency pantry work at the native parish of Our Lady of Guadalupe. This is a much smaller operation but it does provide assistance in conjunction with the two visits allowed by the Food Bank and the monthly government assistance cheque to provide a regular food source.

Vandale emphasized that "we are a parish" and the opportunity is always there to minister to people who may come to the

parish from all over the city, often by bus.

Only non-perishables are distributed at the parish food pantry, although a stock of baby food, diapers, milk and toiletries is also available.

Vandale's observations included: "some retired people are forced back to work, unemployed people and those who have recently arrived from reservations are also included in the over 600 who visit regularly over the year."

Regular suppliers of food include the parishes of St. Anne, St. Augustine, and St. Peter and St. Paul. These parishes and other groups also supply Christmas hampers, although Vandale stressed: "January is the toughest month."

The last presentation of the evening featured a brief update of the fundraising for Station 20 West. Well over \$1 million of the early spring target of \$3 million has been raised. One group was hoping to have over 300 items sold at an art auction to raise funds for the project. The 20th Street complex will include a grocery store.

Projects combating poverty described at peace gathering

"Combating poverty, building peace" was the theme of a New Year's Eve multi-faith prayer gathering at St. Paul's Cathedral in Saskatoon.

Some 60 people braved stormy weather to attend the annual evening of prayer for peace Dec. 31, which began with participants lighting vigil candles and placing them on a large fabric map of the world.


Two grassroots projects combating poverty – one in Africa and one in Saskatoon – were highlighted during the evening program, which included prayers and readings in different languages and from different faith traditions.

In sessions entitled "Sharing the Voice of Peace," Maria Zalesak and Betty Jmaeff spoke about the work of Friends of VAKU (Victims of AIDS in Kidera, Uganda), while Tony Haynes described the Station 20 West project, which will bring needed services to Saskatoon core neighbourhoods

Zalesak related how the Friends of VAKU was formed in September 2005 to raise funds to aid widowed grandmothers and mothers raising children and orphans in the AIDSdevastated village of Kidera, 123 miles from Kampala. The group was created after Saskatoon resident Judith Amolo (who immigrated to Canada in 1992) returned to her home village of Kidera to find most of the women infected with HIV AIDS, and struggling to raise their families by themselves, Zalesak said.

A board of seven Catholics, mainly from St. Mary's parish, raises funds through steak nights, garage sales and donations.

"The money we have been sending to Kidera has been used mainly to pay for students' school fees, texts, and uniforms. Some money has been used for livestock, seeds

and repairing homes. The goal is to help as many people as possible to become self-sustaining," Zalesak said.

Betty Jmaeff described her June 2008 visit to the Ugandan village with Judith Amolo. "At the time of our visit there were 47 women in Kidera – some mothers, some grandmothers – all widows, all living with AIDS."

In nine days they were able to visit 37 homes in the community, where women welcomed them with joy, and were eager to share what they had with the visitors.

Jmaeff and Amolo also visited the two primary schools in the village. Jmaeff described one Grade 1 classroom with an enrolment of 160 students.

In a meeting with high school students who are able to attend school because of support received from Friends of VAKU, the visitors "learned of their difficulties and determination," Jmaeff said, describing how high school students from Kidera must walk a minimum of two hours to school every day and two hours back, often arriving home after dark. "Our goal for 2009 is to provide boarding costs for more students, as well as the school fees," she said, recalling how

on their last day in the village a student came to say thank you and goodbye, adding quietly: "please don't forget about us."

Station 20 West is an effort to revitalize core neighbour-hoods in Saskatoon by providing a source of nutritious food, health services and community support, in conjunction with affordable housing, described Tony Haynes, director of Justice and Peace for the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saskatoon.

When provincial funding was cut for the project earlier this year, the community rallied to express support for the project, Haynes said. "We look at what we are doing as a non-political effort," he said. "It's an example of taking a further step to enhance the life of people in our community."

As with the recent political campaign of president-elect Barack Obama in the United States, many small donations are making a difference, Haynes said, noting that close to \$1.6 million has now been raised. He said such donations are helping to create a "civilized society for all of Saskatoon."

Several speakers from different faith traditions spoke

during the evening program, including Bishop Albert LeGatt, who took up Pope Benedict XVI's theme for the World Day of Peace Jan. 1, 2009: "fighting poverty to build peace."

"In linking peace and poverty together, the Holy Father calls us to reflect on the negative repercussions for peace when entire populations live in poverty," LeGatt said.

"Areas of solidarity and international cooperation must be developed in the fight against poverty if peace is to have a chance to grow in our world."

LeGatt quoted Pope Benedict's message that "effective means to redress the marginalization of the world's poor through globalization will only be found if people everywhere feel personally outraged by the injustices in the world."

Where justice and solidarity take root, peace will flower, added the bishop. "Let us pray that each of our hearts will open to the needs of the poor and that we will seek the changes of lifestyle and commitment of time and self that will indeed bring greater solidarity and so greater peace."

Couple inspired by Retrouvaille meeting in Rome

An international Retrouvaille gathering in Rome this fall, which included a meeting with Pope Benedict XVI, was an inspiring event for a Saskatchewan couple.

"Such affirmation of our baptismal call and our vocation as married couples to act as God's servants is beyond anything we could ever have imagined," said Joanne Laird, who along with her husband Ben attended the September gathering in Rome as representatives of Retrouvaille Saskatchewan.

Retrouvaille is a ministry of healing and reconciliation to couples whose marriage is going through difficulties, including those who may already be separated from each other. The ministry consists of a weekend retreat, led by presenting couples who have also struggled in their relationship, as well as by a priest. The ministry originated in Quebec but is now international in scope. Retrouvaille reports a high success rate, based on the number of marriages that are happily intact five years after the weekend.

Three hundred couples and 50 priests, representing 17 countries, participated in the international Retrouvaille conference in Rome, hosted by the Italian Retrouvaille Community and the Italian Family Life Office.

Joanne Laird noted that the international flavour of the event in Rome was inspiring and that it nurtured both her personal faith and her desire to share Retrouvaille with others.

"The knowledge and direction we experienced at the International Conference is absolutely something you would never experience anywhere else," said Ben.

In his address to the group, Pope Benedict XVI reflected on the 30 years of Retrouvaille and noted that he had, "recognized the finger of God that is the action of the Holy Spirit which inspires in the Church answers to the needs and emergencies of each time."

The Holy Father continued: "in their darkest moments, couples have lost hope... They need some 'us'; a company of friends who ... are ready to share part of their hope with those who have lost it." Pope Benedict described the Retrouvaille ministry as a rescue hook that could be offered to couples attempting to climb over a mountain of strain.

Speaking to Retrouvaille representatives, the Pope affirmed their ministry and imparted on them his official apostolic blessing.

The Lairds have been involved in Retrouvaille in leadership for the last year, but have been active in promoting the ministry to those in need since they experienced their first weekend four years ago in Spokane.

"Retrouvaille has the tools for ... couples to rebuild their marriages," Ben said of their experience with the program. "I have learned so much about myself, my feelings and a deeper way of communicating with the help of the Retrouvaille Program".

Retrouvaille has been active in Saskatchewan for two years, offering annual retreats in both Saskatoon and Regina. Organizers are now in conversation with the diocese of Prince Albert about holding weekends there.

"We have held three weekends followed with twelve post sessions this past year. We have served 46 hurting couples. Our hope is that we can continue to reach out to those couples struggling in their marriages," said Ben.

programs from a variety of apostolates and ministries throughout the world, with the goal of developing a totally Catholic and uniquely 'Theresian' program," Tahn said.

As well as the week-long conference, Mother Nadine's keynote address 7 p.m. Friday, Feb. 27 is open to the public. Bishop Albert LeGatt will provide the opening remarks.

The Intercessors of the Lamb is a mixed community of priests, brothers, sisters and laity whose primary charism is to pray for priests. "The apostolate of the Intercessors is continuing the redemptive mission of the Lamb of God through His powerful 'burden-bearing' ministry of intercession," said Tahn. On May 27, 1998, the Intercessors of the Lamb were recognized as a Public Association of the Christian Faithful, the second step in becoming an Apostolic Society.

We have a hope and a calling which Jesus Christ came to affirm and to draw out from each one of us," Tahn said.

"We at St. Therese Healing and Growth Centre desire to walk in the simplicity of St. Therese as her children. We desire to learn from the Little Flower, who teaches us the extraordinary love of God in the ordinariness of our daily lives and struggles. We desire to entrust our littleness, through the hands of Our Blessed Mother, to the heart of Him who loves us," he added.

The Healing and Growth Centre will be announcing its own core program at the prayer conference, Tahn said.

In addition to the Healing and Growth Centre's nine-day core program, which will be repeated as need demands, the Centre also hosts programs such as "Healing the Feeling," facilitated by Sr. Teresita Kambeitz, OSU, in November, which focused on forgiveness as a door to inner healing.

The Healing and Growth Centre is open to people of all ages and faiths, noted Tahn.
